MEMBERSHIP

NEW MEMBERS - You have been proposed for membership by _____. Expectations for membership are:

- Submit your application for approval by Board
- Induction into the Club after approval
- Join at least one committee

MEMBERSHIP CHOICES

Individual Membership – membership for one person; dues \$120 per quarter

Corporate Membership – membership for a corporation/business; dues \$120 per quarter; one member is the “official” Rotarian; business can send anyone to attend meetings and service projects etc.

MEMBERSHIP FINAL STEPS

- Application will be reviewed and approved by the Board
- Membership Chair and/or Club Secretary will contact Candidate to get any data required to add to Club database. Once added, the Candidate's sponsor will meet with them to explain the website and member access.
- Membership Chair will confer with sponsor and candidate to schedule a date for induction
- Candidate is encouraged to continue attendance at Rotary Club meetings and other events while waiting
- After induction the Club Treasurer will begin emailing a monthly dues invoice

ROTARY FOUNDATION

The mission of The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. When you give to The Rotary Foundation, you are directly supporting Rotary's work. Your gift makes our service projects — projects that eradicate polio, promote peace, and develop communities — happen. Rotary has raised over \$1 billion to immunize all the children in the world against Polio. Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation is more than matching Rotary's contribution in the fight against Polio. As of August 25, 2020, The World Health Organization (WHO) announced that transmission of the wild poliovirus has officially been stopped in all 47 countries of its African region. This is a historic and vital step toward global eradication of polio, which is Rotary's top priority.

The Rotary Foundation awards district and global grants annually that fund club sponsored activities and large-scale international humanitarian projects, vocational training and graduate and post graduate scholarships that focus on these areas:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development
- Environment

Every Rotarian is asked to contribute funds to support the work of the Rotary Foundation. Those who contribute at least \$100 annually to the Rotary Foundation are considered a "sustaining member". The Rotary Club of the Verde Valley collects \$125 annually as part of the member's dues and forwards it to Rotary Foundation on the member's behalf. At the \$125 level the member and club become a part of the "Every Rotarian, Every Year" Club.

Rotary started with the vision of one man — Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. When a Rotarian's contributions add up to \$1,000 they become a Paul Harris Fellow. And the Paul Harris Fellow recognition is given at each subsequent \$1,000 level.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the action we take in the world.

Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- **FIRST:** The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- **SECOND:** High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- **THIRD:** The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- **FOURTH:** The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test is a nonpartisan and nonsectarian ethical guide for Rotarians to use for their personal and professional relationships. The test has been translated into more than 100 languages, and Rotarians recite it at club meetings:

- **Club Service** focuses on making clubs strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership development plan.
